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Supply of Alcohol:

1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence –
 - (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
 - (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence.
2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
3. The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.

In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—

- (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to—
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
 - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).
4. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
5. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
- (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
6. The responsible person must ensure that—
- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
 - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available
7. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption off or on the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 1) In this condition:-
- a) “permitted price” is the price found by applying the formula $P = D \& (D \times V)$, where-
 - (i) P is the permitted price,
 - (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale of the alcohol, and
 - (iv) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;

- b) "duty" is to be constructed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
 - c) "relevant person" means, in relation to the premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence –
 - i) the holder of the premises licence –
 - i) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such licence, or
 - ii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
 - d) "relevant person" means in relation to the premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
 - e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994
- 2) Where the permitted price would not be a whole number of pennies, the permitted price shall be taken to be price rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 3) Where the permitted price on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax, the permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Door Supervision:

Any individual carrying out security activity at the premises must be:

- (a) Authorised to carry out that activity by a licence granted under the Private Security Industry Act 2001; or
- (b) Be entitled to carry out that activity by virtue of section 4 of that Act.

Exhibition of films:

Where the film classification body is specified in the licence, unless subsection (2) (b) applies, admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by that body.

Where:–

- (a) the film classification body is not specified in the licence, or
- (a) the relevant licensing authority has notified the holder of the licence that this subsection applies to the film in question, admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by that licensing authority.

In this section – “children” means persons aged under 18; and
“film classification body” means the person or persons designated as the authority under
Section 4 of the Video Recordings Act 1984 (c.39) authority to determine suitability of video
works for classification.

Annex 2: Conditions consistent with the operating systems.

Justices Licence Conditions/Undertakings

This licence is subject to a condition pursuant to Section 86 of the Licensing Act 1964 that the
Off sales part of the Licensed Premises shall not be used for the sale and supply of
intoxicating liquor for consumption on the premises. (9.12.71)

Licensing Act 1964

Licensed Premises - Credit Sales (s.166)

Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied unless it is paid for before or at the time when it is sold
or supplied, except alcohol sold or supplied:

- (a) with and for consumption at a meal supplied at the same time, consumed with the meal and
paid for together with the meal;
- (b) for consumption by a person residing in the premises or his guest and paid for together
with his accommodation;
- (c) to a canteen or mess.

On Licensed Premises with No Children’s Certificate – Children in Bars (s.168, 171, 201)

No person under fourteen shall be in the bar of the licensed premises during the permitted
hours unless one of the following applies:

- (1) He is the child of the holder of the premises licence.
- (2) He resides in the premises, but is not employed there.
- (3) He is in the bar solely for the purpose of passing to or from some part of the premises
which is not a bar and to or from which there is no other convenient means of access or
egress.
- (4) The bar is in railway refreshment rooms or other premises constructed, fitted and intended
to be used bona fide for any purpose to which the holding of the licence is ancillary.
In this condition “bar” includes any place exclusively or mainly used for the consumption of
intoxicating liquor. But an area is not a bar when it is usual for it to be, and it is, set apart for
the service of table meals and alcohol is only sold or supplied to persons as an ancillary to
their table meals.

NOTES

16. The exemption under LA 1964 is to the child of the “licence-holder”. This could translate
into the child of the premises licence holder or the children of any of the personal licence
holders or both. The better view is the former: the latter would create uncertainty and a
potential plethora of children permitted to occupy the bar, depending on the number of
personal licence holders working there at any one time.

General – All four licensing objectives:

In order to further the licensing objectives the licensee reserves the right to move the fire appliances, AWP Machines, cigarette machines and any other similar objects temporarily in a fixed location which may impact on the ability of individuals on the premises to use exits or escape routes without impediment.

The interior of the premises is well lit, airy and bright.

The outside of the premises is well lit.

The prevention of crime and disorder:

CCTV cameras installed and on the premises (Codes of practice adopted as below)

All interior trading areas are visible to the staff from behind the bar server

The toilets access is clearly visible from the bar servers and the toilets are checked regularly.

The licensee/staff monitor customer's behaviour, especially during busy periods

There is always a minimum of 2 staff on duty at any one time.

Public safety:

Premises has a fire alarm which is maintained

Emergency lighting is installed and maintained on the premises.

Fire Extinguishers are installed and maintained.

Gas and electrical certificates are in place and are tested annually

An accident and incident book is kept on the premises.

Staffs are aware of the applicant's disability policy and assistance is always available.

The prevention of public nuisance:

Management have control of the music system.

All windows are kept closed when entertainment is provided.

When required, staff organise taxis to transport customers home.

At the end of each evening a member of staff will stand at the exit door to ensure that they depart in a quiet and orderly manner.

Curtains on windows/double glazing/lobby doors.

The protection of children from harm:

No unaccompanied children allowed on the premises.
No children under the age of 16 allowed on the premises after 21.00 hours
Cigarette machine is positioned in sight of bar servers.
Full ranges of soft drinks are stocked.
AWP machines are positioned within easy sight of the bar server.
Management regularly walk around the premises.

CCTV Codes of Practice:

The below listed codes of practice are the minimum that the Humberside Police find acceptable when CCTV is proposed to address one or more of the Licensing Objectives under the Licensing Act 2003.

1. Any CCTV system will need to be registered in accordance with the Data Protection Act.
2. There shall be sufficient cameras to cover those areas that are not easily supervised from the bar including outside areas. The police licensing officer can be consulted as to location of cameras.
3. A monitor should be placed in such a position so as to be viewed by staff working in the sales area of the premises.
4. The system must be capable of continuously recording and copies of such recordings shall be kept for a period of not less than 28 days.
5. If the system uses tapes then there should be sufficient for 28 days. These tapes will need to be replaced every six months to maintain the quality of the images recorded.
6. Any system installed should be capable of producing copies of recordings on site.
7. Copies of recordings shall be provided on request to a police officer or officer of the local authority on production of his/her identification
8. The designated premises supervisor will be responsible for the operation of the system and shall ensure that it is maintained in accordance with these codes of practice.
9. Records of maintenance of the CCTV system shall be kept by the person responsible and the system shall be maintained in working order records of any maintenance shall be produced on request to a police officer or an officer of the local authority on production of their identification.
10. Camera(s) will be sited to cover all entrances.
11. Recordings must be made of each trading period conducted at the premises.
12. All CCTV recordings will be time and date marked.
13. All recordings shall be in real time and of evidential quality.

Note:

The Police licensing officers are available to give advice on the location of cameras etc. should this be required.

Sample objective entry:-A CCTV system is installed and will be operated in accordance with the codes of practice attached to this application. The responsible person is the 'Designated Premises Supervisor'.
